Photography Tips

This month I'm going to tell you how to create light trails by using a long exposure setting on your camera.

Light Trails

Have you have ever seen pictures of light trails and wondered how the photographer achieved the effect? The light trail effect is easy to achieve. All you need is camera capable of taking long exposures (about three seconds), a tripod, and a safe vantage point away from ambient light. A camera with a bulb (B) setting and a remote shutter release are optimal for achieving this effect.

The example used here involves photographing moving vehicles, so personal safety is essential. Also, you want to ensure moving vehicles do not create vibration to your camera or your pictures will be capture the vibration.

Find a location that offers optimal view of a road that has a relatively steady flow of moving traffic. You are best to have the closest traffic lane moving away from you in order to avoid shooting directly into headlights. Set the camera on a stable tripod at approximately a suitable angle to the traffic to ensure you capture the full effect of the light trail.

You will need to take several shots to determine the best shutter speed for the present traffic speed. High speed roads work best since the effect can be achieved with less exposure time. Stabilize the camera on a tripod on level ground. Since you will be shooting with a long exposure, any wind or vibration will surely appear on your photographs. Take a moment and be sure your flash is set not to fire; ambient light is all you need for this shot; however, you can experiment with a flash if you have objects you would like to appear on the photograph.

Set your camera to Tv, or shutter priority, and set the time to about three seconds. If you do not have a remote release cable, then set the camera timer so you do not touch the camera during the shot. Snap the shot as traffic passes at a steady rate (be sure to compensate for the timer delay if you use it).

Review your shots and adjust the shutter speed accordingly until you achieve the desired result. This technique requires patience and practice to perfect, so do not become frustrated if you do not end up with a perfect photograph the first time out.
